
Year 5/6 Eco Escape Room

Digital Devices - Capturing the Balance

In today's digital world, devices are a big part of our children's lives—for learning, connection, and play. While technology can be enriching, it can be challenging to manage screen time without conflict. Rather than focusing solely on limits or bans, it's more effective to support balanced use by creating healthy routines, having open conversations, and involving children in setting expectations. 

At school we endeavour to teach our students how to use technology as a tool for learning, grounded on an ICT agreement introduced at

the start of the year.â€

With guidance and shared responsibility, we can help our children enjoy technology in ways that support their learning, wellbeing and real-life growth.

As we head into the holiday period, the following tips may be helpful in capturing this balance

Top 5 Tips for Balanced Device Use

- 1. **Model Healthy Tech Habits:** Children notice how we use screens. Show what balanced use looks like by setting boundaries around your own device time.
- 2. **Create Screen-Free Zones & Times:** Set clear times and places—like mealtimes, before school, or bedrooms—where screens are put away to prioritise connection and rest.
- Involve Kids in Setting Limits: Co-create agreements about screen time and responsibilities. When children help shape the
 rules, they're more likely to respect them.
- 4. **Prioritise Real Life First:** Make sure key parts of the day—like physical activity, relationships, chores, and rest—come before screens.
- 5. Be Curious, Not Controlling: Talk openly about what your child enjoys online. Build trust through understanding rather than constant monitoring.

PBIS Value Jars


